The mission of the Madison-Morgan Conservancy's Junior Conservancy is to develop and sustain a heritage conservation ethic in Morgan County's youth through education, civic engagement, community service, and social events.

- Education Organize and participate in educational opportunities that inspire the Morgan County community to protect special places for the future.
- Civic Engagement Experience working on a board of directors, and interact with local government and other civic groups in Morgan County.
- Community Service Organize and participate in community service activities.
- Social Events Host social events that convene the broader Morgan County community to build support for local heritage conservation efforts.

BOARD MEMBER CRITERIA

- Remain in good academic standing while serving on the JC Board
- Attend at least eight of the nine monthly board meetings (second Sunday of the month from September through May)
- Actively participate in the planning and/or execution of JC events
- Support and abide by the bylaws and policies of the JC
- Act as an ambassador for the Madison-Morgan Conservancy



BOARD MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

The Junior Conservancy Board (JC) meets September through May on the second Sunday of the month. Members are appointed for a one-year term. The board consists of 7-15 high school students who live in Morgan County and will:

- Elect Lead Organizers to lead the four silos of activity: education, service, civic, and social
- Organize one event each year within each of the four silos
- Create and execute one fundraiser to help fund the JC Board's budget
- Assist Conservancy staff in executing the Annual Membership Supper in spring
- Design and publish a yearbook at the end of the year
- Promote the mission of the Madison-Morgan Conservancy and serve as Conservancy ambassadors in the community
- Evaluate its own composition and performance and recommend new members for the Junior Conservancy Board
- Mentor incoming board members
